For small children, Mass can be a difficult experience. The readings are often over their heads, the homily is seldom geared to their age level, and the language of many prayers is unfamiliar. To make Mass come alive for them, try these five simple steps.



1 If your children are too young to read, buy them a child's illustrated book on the Mass. Show them in pictures what to watch for at Mass.

2 Visit your parish church sometime when services are not in progress and point out items used at Mass: where Blessed Sacrament is reserved, what the sanctuary lamp is for, and so forth.

3 Before you leave for Mass, look over the readings and discuss them with your children. Relate something from the readings to their own experiences.

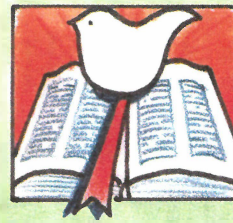
4 Get to Mass early and sit where the children can see what is going on.

5 Later in the day, discuss the gospel again, fitting the message into their lives. Ask them to decide upon one thing they can do this week to act upon Jesus' words.

If you follow the preceding steps to introduce the children to the Mass, you will be preparing their hearts to accept the Word of God and act upon it.

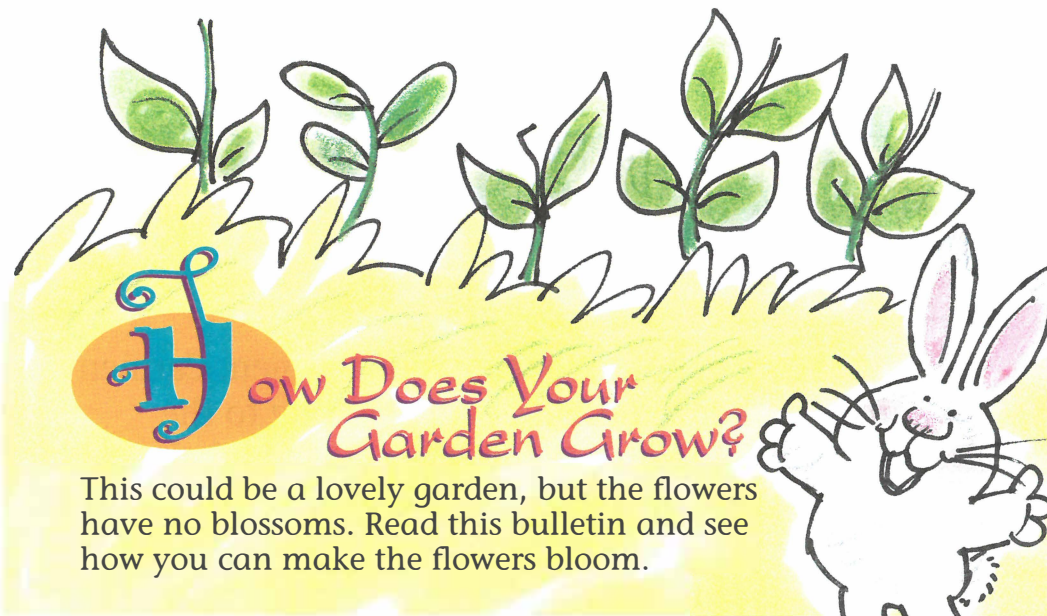

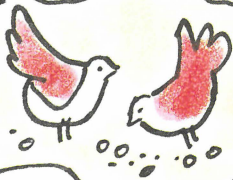
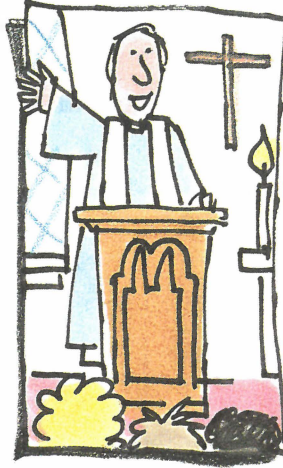


This could be a lovely garden, but the flowers have no blossoms. Read this bulletin and see how you can make the flowers bloom.

Two rows behind Lionel stands Carmen. Carmen has things on her mind. She isn't listening to the priest. She is going on a picnic after Mass and she can hardly wait. Carmen wishes Mass would be over.



(Some of the seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked it.)

Toward the front of church are Mark and Amanda. Their family always sits toward the front so they can see and hear everything. Mark and Amanda try to listen carefully because they want to know more about Jesus. Later, they'll ask their Dad or Mom to explain anything they didn't understand at Mass.



(Some of the seed landed on good soil....)

God is the farmer out planting the field, and the seed is Jesus' Word. Love grows from the seed that falls on good soil. When God plants the seed in your heart this week, how will your garden grow?
